

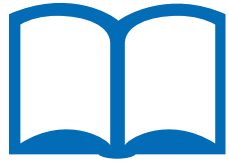

# Education

## Response strategy

1. Focus on expanding education access by targeting out of school children to join a suitable mode of learning at their appropriate age
2. Continued support to children in school to enhance retention and transitions – nursery to primary and from primary to secondary.
3. Design innovative projects that target promotion of equity in education both for learners and teachers
4. Engagement with education authorities and the communities to provide immediate to medium term solutions to teachers needs
5. Advocacy to donors and humanitarian actors to take up education development needs manifested in North East Nigeria
6. Capacity building of teachers and supporting their welfare
7. Integration and collaboration with other humanitarian key sectors –Health, WASH, Food Security, etc
