Humanitarian Situation Update	<p>Central Equatoria Wonduruba County:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Wonduruba and Katigiri town remains deserted. 28,668 IDPs from Wonduruba are in Lainya, Juba, Kuda, Ganji, Sirmon and Berekek Wonduruba-Lainya road remains closed. <p>Juba & Lainya County: Ongoing verification of 2,834 individuals in Kuda and 4,287 in Sirimon and NFI distribution will follow.</p> <p>Western Equatoria:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Sharp increase in outflow of South Sudanese from WES to Uganda through Nimule road since the beginning of last week, estimated that 500 SS refugees are registered every day. Ezo County: Ongoing clashes reported in Ri-Riangu area and Diabio. Planned assessments still pending as people are still displaced in Ezo and Source Yubu/Tambura. Yambio: IDP registration completed in Yambio Town: A total of 775 households (325 houses burned and 450 houses looted). Response planned once IDPs return back to their villages. <p>Jonglei Pibor: Sporadic shooting in Pibor town reported on 6 January. More than 260 residents in Pibor sought safety in UNMISS, and they later moved further to the neighboring villages. Bor: On 9 January a fight broke out in the PoC between IDPs in the market area and 10 IDPs injured.</p> <p>Unity</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Leer/Thonyor humanitarian response ongoing. <p>Bentiu PoC:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Malaria outbreak in the PoC has reduced to almost normal rates - from 8,000 to 3,600 weekly Bentiu stakeholders under pressure from casual workers to increase their allowances / wages 		

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	<p>Upper Nile Malakal:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 10 Jan: Fire broke out in sector 1. Entire block G was razed and 1 child killed & 6 others injured. The cause of the fire is unknown. Partners responded with emergency food and NFIs (Urgent need of 350 tents). • Increased number of explosive devices in and around Malakal PoC and Malakal town. • Two incidents of explosions reported on 9 Jan, one due to grenade explosion and another from explosive device in scrap metals. 8 people died and 18 others injured from the explosions. • Ongoing biometric registration in Wau Shilluk by IOM. 20,000 individuals registered since Dec. • Maban County: • 4 Jan, reported air bombardment in Khor Tumbak, border area between Maban and Blue Nile (Sudan). Eight people reported injured with five seriously wounded. <p>Discussion</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Street Children Aid are planning a FTR intervention in Juba and Lainya Counties, where there is ongoing verification. • Nonviolent Peaceforce is doing education on explosive devices in Malakal, addressing explosives in and around Malakal PoC / town. 		
Family Tracing and Reunification update	<p>FTR 2015 work achievements and 2016 planning:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Reviewing SOP & ISP for FTR in SSD. Partner feedback being gathered during revision process. • RapidFTR evaluation in Dec 2015 / January 2016. Dissemination carried out on 12 January, and the report will be shared with partners after approval. • Capacity building for FTR partners scheduled for February 2016; dates will be communicated with partners. • Next FTRWG meeting on Friday 22 January 2016 at SCI offices. <p>FTR Caseload Update (8 January 2016): 11,599 children (8,609 active), 5,514 followed up, 3,280 reunified (30% reunification rate).</p> <p>Discussion</p> <p>There was a request for an FTR performance report for 2015, to enable partners reflect and improve performance going forward. It was highlighted as important, in order to track performance on an annual basis, and also enable comparisons such as 2015 versus 2016 achievements.</p> <p>There was discussion around how to improve coordination between FTR & CAAFAG. Save the Children provides capacity building and technical support to partners implementing FTR in Pibor, a CAAFAG response area. It was agreed that this discussion proceed in order to tap synergies in the work.</p>	FTR performance report for 2015	FTRWG

Over 16,000 children estimated as CAAFAGs, therefore large releases expected. <p>CAAFAG</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> CAAFAG WG – next meeting on 21 January 2016 Planning capacity building for CAAFAG partners starting 1 February (request for proposals currently underway). These will be 5 one-week trainings. Planning meeting with SPLA legal advisor, for advice on dates of releases. CAAFAG consultants / specialist roles have been advertised to meet the expected releases. Developing CAAFAG SOPs for South Sudan. 		
Psychosocial Support WG	<p>Comments on PSS presentation:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Importance of PSS meeting, to bring together partners and reflect / review 2015 and way forward. PSS partners encouraged to use PSS reporting tool. 		
Field updates	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Boma (TdH): reported incident of six individuals (a mother and her five children) shot by armed civilians, resulting in the passing away of one child. Kizito (hospital) pulling out of Boma, therefore need for gap-filling. CINA is planning child protection assessment in Bor (population living in islands). CINA will confirm if the assessment will be an IRNA or Child Protection assessment. Partners in Bor are encouraged to participate. Dates for the assessment are yet to be confirmed. SCA joining assessment in Western Equatoria State (Yambio). Other Child Protection partners are encouraged to participate. A reported incident of a child shot and injured at a cattle camp in Aweil. 	<p>Confirmation of assessment in Bor (dates and type of assessment).</p> <p>Confirmation of Yambio assessment dates.</p>	<p>CINA</p> <p>SCA</p>
