3	<p><b>Epidemiological Update</b> MoPHP disease surveillance officer provided the updated Yemen situation for following diseases of interest (Cholera and Dengue fever)</p> <p>1) <b>Cholera (As of week 37)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- <b>19,240</b> cases of suspected Cholera reported with <b>19</b> associated deaths for 2021 (CFR 0.10%)</li> <li>- Most affected governorate is Taiz (<b>13,291</b>)</li> <li>- <b>48.8%</b> of cases are male</li> <li>- Most affected age groups are under 5 years closely followed by 5 to 14</li> <li>- Most affected district in Taiz are Al Mudhafar, Ash Shamayatayn, Salh, and, closely followed by Al Qahirah.</li> </ul> <p>2) <b>Dengue Fever (As of week 37)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- <b>13,323</b> cases of Dengue fever were reported with <b>21</b> associated deaths in 2021(CFR 0.16%)</li> <li>- Taiz and Aden are most affected governorates closely followed by Lahj and Shabwah</li> <li>- Most cases reported in <b>Taiz (5,361)</b></li> <li>- 56.29% of all cases were male.</li> <li>- Most affected age groups are 25 to 34 closely followed by 15 to 24 years</li> </ul> <p><b>For more information, please find in the attached PowerPoint on cholera and dengue</b></p>	
4	<p><b>Reproductive Health IAWG updates</b> Reproductive health coordinator updated partners on RHIAWG activities</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- 75 Supported RH HF's received PPE and IPC material from partners</li> <li>- RHCS Committee conducted its regular meeting to discuss the extent of implementation of the supply plan for the current year 2021 and the commitment of the partners</li> <li>- UNFPA distributed the contraceptives and lifesaving maternal medication to all IRG area.</li> </ul>

6	<p><b>Shabwa and Marib Response</b></p> <p>Health cluster team presented on response to the ongoing conflict in Marib and Shabwa.</p> <p>1) Marib</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- More than 1043 HHs (6,948 individuals) displaced from Rahabah district due conflict</li> <li>- More than 128 HHs displaced from Harib district due conflict</li> <li>- These are several cases with injuries in General Marib and Kara’a hospitals</li> <li>- WHO supported with 3 TESK and 6000 Blood bags</li> <li>- MSF Support Kara hospital in in Emergency unit and operation room</li> <li>- One mobile clinic provided health services to IDPs in Al-Jubah district</li> <li>- Mobile clinics and two health facilities provide health services to the new IDPs from Rahabah and Harib districts</li> <li>- Need to support Shaheed Mohammed Hail hospital, and Al-Hosoun hospital, Kara hospital and General Marib hospital</li> <li>- Need to support the health facilities with medicines and medical supplies especially with IEHKs</li> </ul> <p>2) Shabwah</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- New conflict in Bayhan, Al-Ain, and Usaylan district</li> <li>- Many casualties due to ongoing conflict - From Sept 15th to 27th sept 2020, there are also 39 injuries and 30 deaths.</li> <li>- Health cluster provide 20 IEHKs to Shabawa</li> <li>- WHO supported with 3 TESK and 600 Blood bags</li> </ul> <p><b>For more information, please find in the health cluster PowerPoint.</b></p>

8	<p><b>Partners Update</b></p> <p><b>1) International Medical Corps (IMC)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- IMC Program Goal: To contribute to the prevention and reduction of mortality and morbidity of vulnerable and conflict-affected populations in Yemen through integrated Health, Nutrition, WASH, Food Security and Livelihoods Services</li> <li>- IMC presented on innovative software to manage pharmaceuticals - The Pharmaceutical Information Management System (PIMS) is a software solution designed by IMC that enables field medical and pharmaceutical teams to manage pharmaceuticals within the last-mile of the pharma supply chain cycle more efficiently than ever before</li> </ul> <p><b>2) Field Medical Foundation (FMF)</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- FMF has three ongoing grants that provide integrated primary health care services</li> <li>- Health and Nutrition interventions funded by UNICEF; implemented in 12 districts in 5 governorates, while the Communication for Development (C4D) project in 5 districts in 3 governorates</li> <li>- UNFPA funded project: This project aims to contribute to a reduction in maternal and neonatal morbidity and mortality by the provision of lifesaving reproductive health services to women focusing on pregnant.</li> <li>- MSP project: To provide essential health services to vulnerable populations through implementation of Yemen Minimum Service Package (MSP) in 3 districts in Al-Dalea governorate</li> </ul> <p>For more information, please find in the health cluster PowerPoint.</p>
