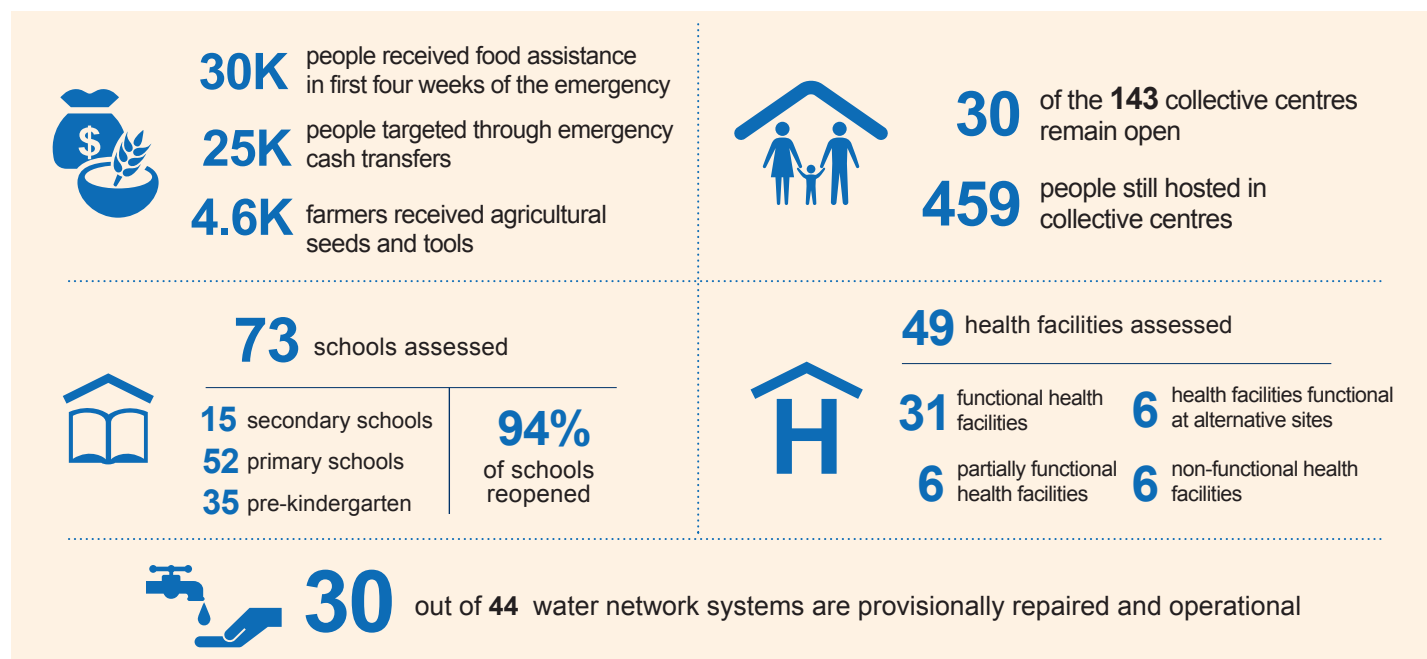


## SITUATION OVERVIEW

Three months after Hurricane Maria struck Dominica as a Category 5 hurricane, the Government and humanitarian actors continue to work together to address the needs of the most affected. Even though the situation is normalising throughout the country, Dominica remains seriously impacted. Over 80 percent of houses still have inadequate roofing, many children have not yet returned to school, 90 per cent of the population still does not have electricity, and a sizeable portion of the population is highly vulnerable due to the loss of their main source of livelihoods.

Humanitarian actors are transitioning from relief to recovery-oriented activities and coordination mechanisms are reflecting this shift. A growing number of ministries and partners take part in sector coordination mechanisms, which is conducive to more comprehensive and complementary action plans. The Ministry of Planning has taken over multi-sector coordination from the Emergency Operations Centre.



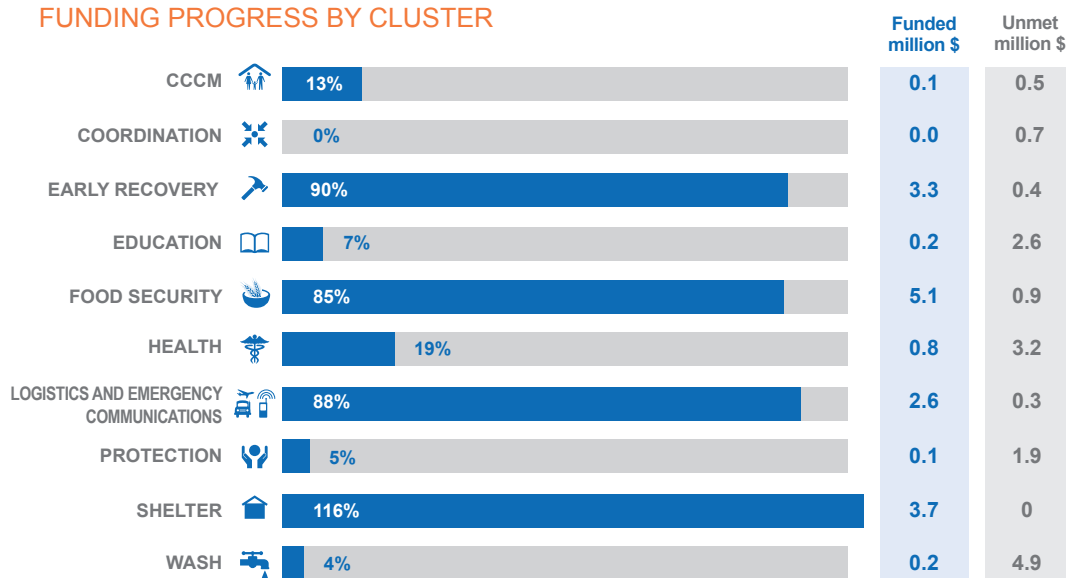

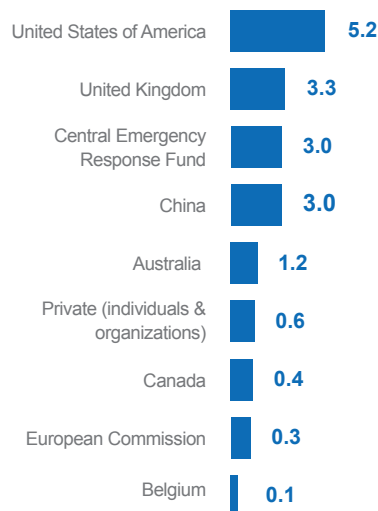

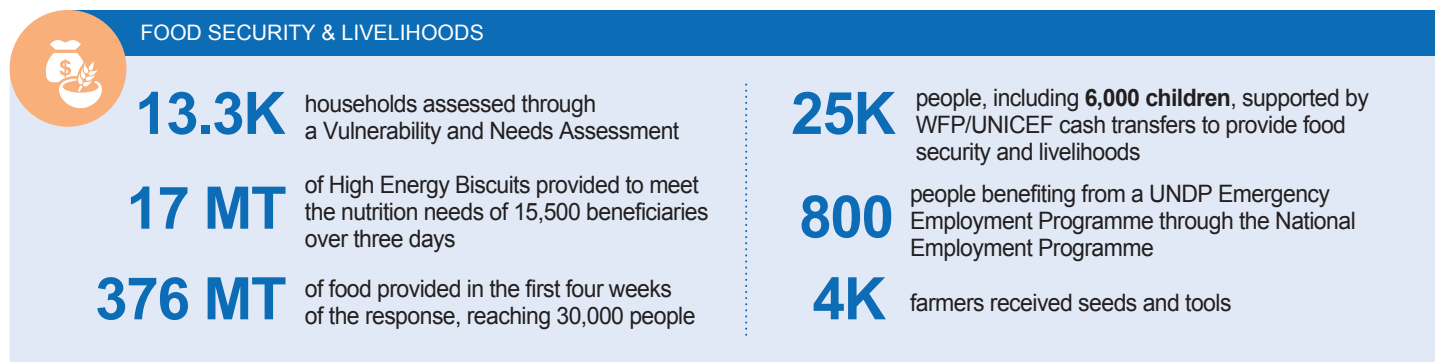
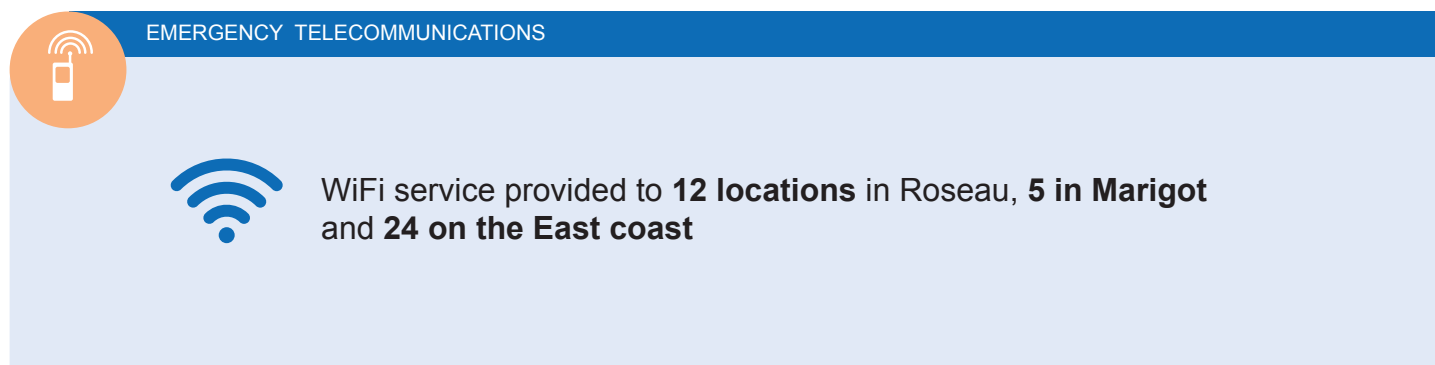
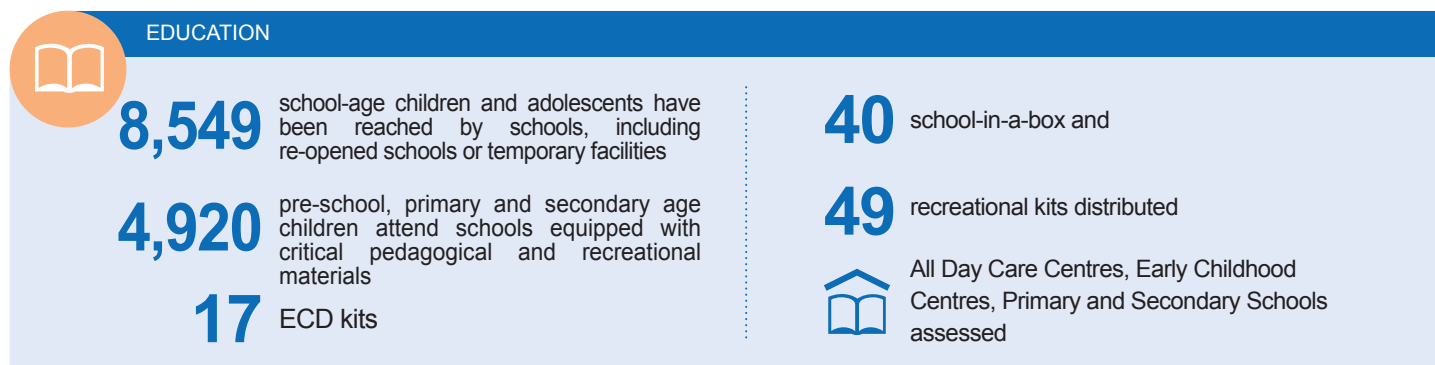
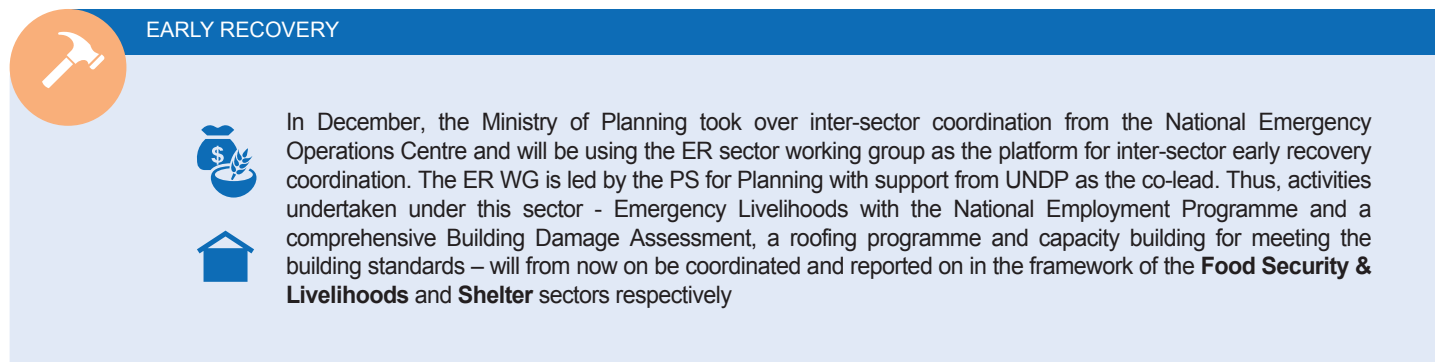
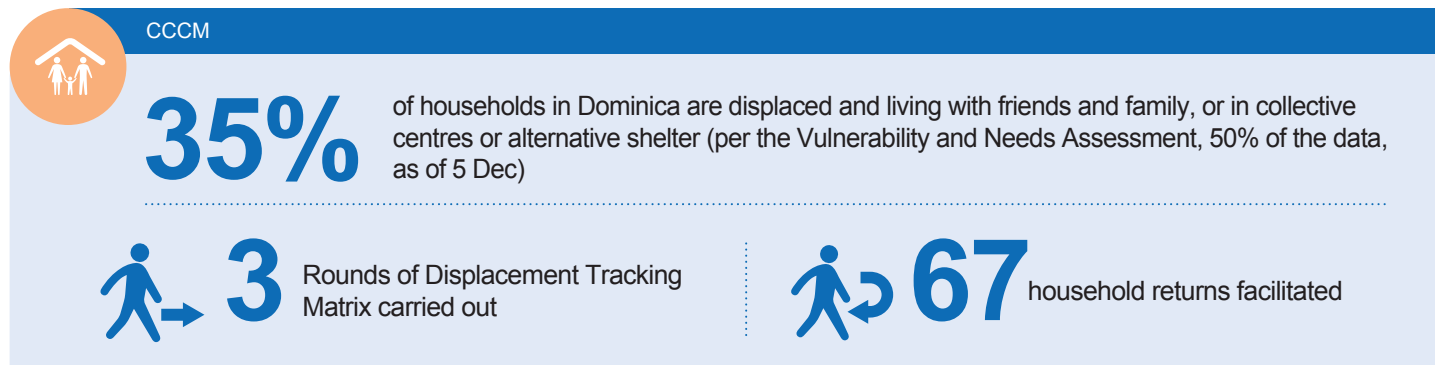
### FUNDING PROGRESS BY CLUSTER

### HEALTH




- 1** Type 3 Health Clinic rehabilitated by PAHO/Americares
- 11** Type 1 Health Clinics scheduled for full repair and/or WASH repair by PAHO, in partnership with IMC and Americares
- 7** 5-kva generators purchased by PAHO for health clinics and Central Medical Stores in Newtown
- 17K+** women of reproductive age and **2,139** pregnant women targeted by 19 UNFPA emergency reproductive health kits to ensure essential sexual and reproductive health services

### LOGISTICS



- 15** partners, including UN, NGOs and Government, assisted with the facilitation and management of storage of humanitarian relief cargo at Roseau seaport
- 700 MT** of relief items dispatched, including in-kind food and non-food items
- 3** 4X4 trucks imported to strengthen logistics capacities
- 4** mobile storage units established in four strategically located hubs
- 797** Humanitarian staff flew UNHAS in and out of Dominica from mid-September to mid-November
- 9MT** of non-food items were flown in through UNHAS

### PROTECTION




- 1,219** facilitators trained in providing psychosocial support in schools, including **1,023 teachers**
- 9K+** children benefited from child protection activities, including psychosocial support and safe spaces
- 19** Child Friendly Spaces established, reaching **333 children**
- 63** Government, NGO and community-based organisations front-line workers and victims of Gender Based Violence (GBV) trained in GBV guiding principles, survivor-centred approaches and psychological first aid

### SHELTER



- 25K+** people received Non-Food Items distributions
- 42K+** people received shelter items
- 20K+** building surveys carried out through a comprehensive Building Damage Assessment
- 400** construction professionals trained on updated building codes

### WASH



- 11K** people receiving water through water trucking services
- 95%** of primary and secondary schools with access to water and sanitation (**69 of 73 schools**)
- 15K+** people received hygiene kits
- 60K** Aquatabs delivered by PAHO to treat **300,000 litres** of water
- 20** water tanks purchased by PAHO for health clinics (10 **600-gallon** water tanks and 10 **800-gallon** water tanks)
